General Information

Event Rules

- Each team will be comprised of four members. All scores will be used to determine the total team score.
- All attire of riders and handlers and all tack is to be considered legal in selection classes.
- All halter horses will be judged as sound, therefore halter horses will NOT be tracked. All
 performance classes will be judged as they go regarding soundness.
- AQHA novice rules will be used in Hunter Under Saddle, Ranch Pleasure, and Western Pleasure classes in reference to headset and head carriage.
- Any participant possessing an electronic device (cell phone, smart watch, etc.) in the event area
 is subject to disqualification and will be asked to leave the contest area.
- Contestants will not be allowed to talk to each other. Any questions should be directed to group leaders. Contestants will be asked to leave the contest area if they are found talking to one another at any time during the contest, and they will receive "0" scores on all remaining classes and reasons.
- Contestants not following directions or displaying disrespectful behavior will be asked to leave and will receive "0" points on the remaining scores.

Event Format

Materials each participant needs to provide:

- Two (or more) sharpened No. 2 pencils
- Basic calculator (No cell phone calculators allowed.)
- Notebook or clipboard with blank paper (No pre-printed materials allowed.)
- Clothing suited to the climatic conditions of the day (coats, gloves, etc. While stocking hats would be allowed, cowboy hats or any type of hat that might block the view of other participants will not be allowed.)
- Water bottle and/or snack if desired

Materials provided by contest coordinators:

- Scantron sheets
- AQHA score sheets for pertinent classes

INDIVIDUAL ACTIVITIES

Identification class (50 points)

Participants will identify breeds, colors and markings of horses, tack and equipment, and/or leg deviations (i.e., toed out, toed in, sickle hocked etc.,). Each problem will be worth 2 points each with 25 items total.

Written exam (50 points)

Participants will take a multiple-choice written exam with questions covering a variety of topics related to the equine industry. Contestants will work individually on this exam. Questions will be drawn from the list of references cited in the National FFA Horse Evaluation Handbook (listed below). There will be 25 questions, each worth 2 points. The score earned on the written exam will be included in each individual's score for the contest, and each participant's score on the exam will be included in the team's total score for the event.

Selection classes (300 points)

A total of 6 classes, consisting of halter and performance classes, will be evaluated. There will be three classes of reasons, with at least 1 set coming from halter and at least 1 set coming from performance. Classes will be approximately 12 to 15 minutes in length. All classes will be 50 points.

Halter classes will be evaluated. Halter classes may be represented by the following breeds and types: Quarter Horse, Conformation Hunter, Appaloosa, Arabian, Paint, American Saddlebred, Morgan, or Draft breeds. All halter classes will be evaluated as sound.

Performance classes will be evaluated. Performance classes may include Western Horsemanship, Hunt Seat Equitation, Western Pleasure, Ranch Riding, Ranch Pleasure, Ranch Trail, Western Riding, Reining, English Pleasure (Saddle Seat), Hunter Under Saddle (Hunt Seat), Trail and Hunter Hack. Performance classes will be evaluated as presented (unsoundness to be penalized accordingly). Patterns and scoresheets will be provided to the teams prior to the start of the event for all classes requiring patterns.

*Note regarding performance classes: every effort is being made to offer live performance classes to contestants, but if inclement weather causes the contest to move to Stanley Stout Center (where wood chips will be on the arena floor), performance classes will consist of video classes.

Oral Reasons (150 points)

Participants will give a total of 3 sets of oral reasons. There will be 1 or 2 performance classes selected from Western Pleasure, Ranch Riding, Ranch Pleasure, Ranch Trail, Western Riding, Western Horsemanship, Hunt Seat Equitation, Reining, English Pleasure (Saddle Seat), Hunter Under Saddle (Hunt Seat), Trail and Hunter Hack as reasons classes. (50 points each)

There will be 1 or 2 halter classes selected from the halter classes listed above as reasons classes (50 points each).

Reasons classes will not be announced until the conclusion of the judging event, so participants should take notes on all possible reasons classes.

Note: 25 points will be deducted on each set of reasons if participants use notes during oral reasons presentations. Points will also be deducted for oral reasons exceeding 2 min. in length.
